 On 19 September 1989, 170 people were killed when French Airlines UTA Flight 772 was destroyed by a suitcase bomb while en route from Chad to Paris. Despite being one of the deadliest acts of terrorism in history, it remained overshadowed by the

Lockerbie tragedy that had taken place ten months earlier. Both attacks were carried out at the instruction of Libyan dictator Qaddafi, but while "Lockerbie" became synonymous with international terrorism, UTA 772 became the "forgotten flight". As a lawyer, Stuart H. Newberger represented the families of the seven Americans killed in the UTA 772 attack. Now he brings all the pieces together to tell its story for the first time, revealing in riveting prose how French investigators cracked the case and taking us inside the courtroom to witness the litigation against the Libyan state that followed. In the age of globalization, *The Forgotten Flight* provides a fascinating insight into the pursuit of justice across international borders.

It was the first U.S. airline to order the supersonic transport; it accepted reservations for the first service to the Moon. Then Pan American Airways fell to earth. In *Skygods*, Robert Gandt, a Pan Am pilot for 26 years, gives an inside account of the great airline's unprecedented demise. He interviewed hundreds of former Pan Am airmen & executives. He reveals how Pan Am's captains, in Navy-style uniforms, once commanded their ships like petty tyrants. They were the best & brightest in airline industry, but there were disturbing stories of captains who allowed stewardesses to land their aircraft, flew them at the wrong altitude & in the wrong direction & who tragically disappeared, often without a trace. All was not well either in the Pan Am Building, the massive landmark in New York where a succession of impulsive & short-sighted CEOs combined to preside over the demise of a great airline. Pan Am bought a domestic airline it did not need; bought aircraft it did not need & operated half-empty planes on low-density routes. It sold the entire Pacific network for a bargain price & sold precious assets to meet its payrolls. And then came the Lockerbie tragedy. This is a fascinating account of what can go wrong with a pillar of strength of the U.S. industry, when its leaders lose their sense of direction & when their star employees—the Skygods—discover that they are mere mortals.

Over the years, I thought long and hard whether I should make public the story of my personal life during that time. After all, it could backfire and cause me serious repercussions. My refusal resulted in personal embarrassment, financial ruin, criminal charges, and incarceration in Federal prison. I watched my life go from being at the top of my game, one of the most visible and successful Lobbyists in Washington DC., and from Foreign Agent 4221 to federal inmate 42938-083. My wife and I fought the good fight against all odds. We were decidedly outnumbered, vastly over-spent, and greatly out-gunned. Through it all, and with God's special blessings, our love and support for each other grew stronger. We know firsthand what President Gerald Ford meant when he said, "A government big enough to give you everything you want, is strong enough to take everything you have away." This book is not about payback; it is not about anger and resentment. It tells the truth about the unjust persecution I suffered at the hands of the U.S. Government. I fully expect that the Government will deny what I have said, but now that my story has been written, I am confident that it will never die, because Truth Never Dies.
